

Masonic Trivia

Happy birthday to Dr. Albert Mackay - March 12th

A stalwart of Masonry, Mackay is best known for his books "An Encyclopaedia of Freemasonry and its Kindred Sciences" (1894), "The Symbolism of Freemasonry: Illustrating and Explaining Its Science and Philosophy, its Legends, Myths and Symbols" (1869), and "The Principles of Masonic Law: A treatise on the constitutional laws, usages and landmarks of Freemasonry" (1859). These three books have served Masonry well as the ultimate reference guides, and should be present in every well-read Mason's personal library.

Mackey was the Master of Solomon's Lodge No.1 in 1843. He served as Grand Lecturer and Grand Secretary of The Grand Lodge of South Carolina, as well as Secretary General of the Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States. In addition to being a prolific Masonic author, Dr. Mackay had been a practicing physician until 1844. He was also (editor: unfortunately so) a Union sympathizer during the War Between the States.

Does our Masonic family still exist?



When we refer to the Masonic family, we're talking about all of the bodies that exist for our ladies and children. For the Mason who can't get enough in the Blue Lodge, we have the Scottish Rite with the four different officer lines and the Knights of St Andrew. We have the York Rite with the Chapter, Council and Commandery, and a dozen or more other invitational bodies, and the Shrine with its inner bodies plus the Grotto.

For the ladies, we have Order of the Eastern Star, the Order of Amaranth, the Social Order of the Beauceant, the White Shrine of Jerusalem, and the Daughters of the Nile. The young girls can join Rainbow Girls, and young ladies have Job's Daughters. For young men, we offer the Squires and then DeMolay.

There really is something for every member of the family. But the not-so-well kept secret is that every one of those bodies is suffering from a lack of memberships, with Orders and Chapters and Bethels consolidating or turning in their charters. That should sound familiar to anyone who has been a Master Mason for more than about fifteen minutes.

There is far more to compete with everyone's time than there was even just ten or twelve years ago when Colorado Masonry was enjoying a bit of a renaissance. That was in part thanks to the Dan Brown books and movie adaptations of those books, plus books by Colorado Masons such as Tim Hogan and Rob Herd. But people don't need to join groups or clubs anymore for socializing; there's Facebook and Instagram and Twitter and Tik-Tok for that. Many work from home with the miracle/curse of Zoom and Meet and Teams. Entertainment is streamed via YouTube and Netflix and Hulu and Amazon Prime. You don't even need to go out to eat anymore, just call Uber Eats or DoorDash to get practically anything delivered to your doorstep.

Is it any wonder we can't get people out of their house?

I don't have a magic solution for those problems. If I did, I'd package it up and send it to every Masonic body in the country, and become more famous --- if slightly less verbose - than Albert Pike.

But I do have one thing to offer, and that is you and I are partly to fault. That's right, you and I. "But I'm a dedicated Mason", you may think to yourself. "I'm involved. I'm an officer in Lodge, and I make almost every meeting. I joined the Scottish Rite, and I make it there most months. Heck, I even joined the York Rite and pay my dues. How can it be MY fault?"

It's because our Masonic family isn't all of those appendant bodies. Our Masonic family is our *own individual family members*. It's our wives that eat dinner alone at least once a week while we're at our meetings. We don't want to bother her because she works full time. We don't make an effort to get our kids in Job's Daughters or DeMolay, or even into Scouting because they are in sports with schedules that rival those of professional sports teams. Life is far more complicated these days than it was in the 1950s when Masonic memberships burgeoned, and many bodies had waiting lists.

We make time for what's important in our lives. Masonry is important to me for the ties to something bigger than myself. I made Masonry a priority in my life, and my entire extended family sees that, and participates. I hope your family sees that importance as well. It's up to you and I to keep our entire Masonic family going.
