
Masonic Trivia

V.I.T.R.I.O.L

Over the past eight years, every Brother in Marquis de Lafayette has been first introduced into Masonry by a largely forgotten practice that occurs immediately prior to his Entered Apprentice degree.

During this time before his degree, the candidate sees symbols placed around him and is admonished to consider each of them. While all of those symbols are explained during his posting sessions on the EA degree, some should already be familiar to anyone with freshman college chemistry.

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One of the most curious of these is not a symbol itself, but a appears to be a word -- VITRIOL.

It's a curious word indeed, and one that has largely fallen out of common usage. Vitriol's definition is "bitter or harsh criticism", which in turn was taken from the archaic meaning "acidic".

So why, then, would a candidate be offered this word? A superficial explanation may lie with Masonry's critics. To this day, Masons are often met disdain or outright hate by certain religious groups, by those over-enamored with conspiracy theories accusing us of an end-goal of world domination, of being shape-shift alien lizard people, and of course of worshiping Satan and sacrificing babies. Masons have been met with vitriol by many outsiders over the centuries.

But a closer look will reveal that it's not merely the word VITRIOL, but instead is written V.I.T.R.I.O.L. With that comes the explanation that this is properly an acronym (rather than an initialism), and stands for

Visita Interiora Terrae Rectificando Invenies Occultum Lapidem

This is a Latin phrase that translates to

Visit the interior of the earth and purifying you will find the hidden stone

The origins of this motto was thought to be from a 15th century alchemist, Basilius Valentinus (pictured on the right) who included it in his work *L'Azoth des Philosophes*. Most people associate alchemy with the mediaeval practice of trying to turn lead into gold. This is not a misconception, as the Kings and rulers were always interested in increasing their wealth; the promise that a common element could be turned into gold was one that kept many an alchemist fed and housed by monarchy.

But as a Mason, we know that symbols have many deep layers, rich with promise to those who would but study them. Such as it is with this phrase.

The acid referred to by the acronym VITRIOL was sulphuric acid, which was used by the alchemists to dissolve all non-metallic substances to reveal only gold. Occultum implies the hidden work, and the entire phrase tells us we must visit the interior of the earth – meaning ourselves – to look for the gold inside us, and to reveal that gold by using the acid of our Masonic lessons. This overly simplistic explanation has a direct tie to another lesson presented to the new Entered Apprentice, that of the rough and smooth ashlars. Ponder that superficial definition for its meaning.



Those interested in learning more should refer to Tim Hogan's book "The Alchemical Keys to Masonic Ritual". I'd recommend this for Master Masons only in order to garner the full meaning. There are also a number of Masons in our Lodge who would be more than happy to discuss this in more detail. :
