

# **Masonic Trivia**

Happy President's Day - February 19th, 2024

Our first President of the United States, Worshipful Brother George Washington, was born on February 22<sup>nd</sup>, 1732. In 1882, President Lincoln issued a proclamation that declared February 22<sup>nd</sup> as holiday to celebrate Washington's birthday. This was passed as a federal law in 1879. In 1968, the law was adapted to also celebrate Lincoln's birthday (February 12<sup>th</sup>), and moved to the third Monday of February.

We have had 15 Masonic presidents: George Washington, James Monroe, Andrew Jackson, James Polk, James Buchanan, Andrew Johnson, James Garfield, William McKinley, Theodore Roosevelt, William Taft, Warren Harding, Franklin Roosevelt, Harry Truman, and Gerald Ford.

FYI, Lyndon Johnson was initiated but did not advance, and Ronald Reagan was made an honorary Mason. It's past time to get some Masonry back in the Oval Office.

# The Secretary's Desk

We've all enjoyed the small victories in our lives when things come together in happy circumstance.

My own bit of happenstance began with an unsolicited email several months ago from Bro. Chris Ruli, a Masonic historian and writer, and the Past Grand Historian and Librarian in Washington DC. He told me he was researching a new book that includes our Lodge's namesake. Bro. Ruli had found our website and the short article on how Lafayette's apron came to be in our possession.

He and I exchanged a few emails to verify that we were still in possession of the apron. Being a historian, he asked me for provenance of the apron and its journey from a small Lodge in upstate New York to Denver. Subsequently, I spent several hours in our storage unit going through all the protective tubs with our history so painstakingly recorded by hand in bound ledgers, confident that I could find the appropriate pages documenting the presentation of the apron to our Lodge in 1928. Alas, at least one bound Ledger from the 1920s was missing. (Prior to my tenure as your faithful Secretary, several well-meaning Brothers over the years have borrowed some of our records with the intent to digitize them, while other Brothers were going to do historical presentations to the Lodge. Those records are still missing.)

I had to admit defeat. I asked Bro. Ruli to give me time over the Thanksgiving holiday to do more research.

# ALBERT PIKE LODGE Nº 117 A.F. & A.M. BROTHER NATHAN O. VOSBURGH SEPTEMBER 27, 1928

THIS APRON WAS WORN BY THE MARQUIS DE LAFAYETTE WHEN, ON HIS SECOND VISIT TO THE UNITED STATES IN 1826, HE ATTENDED APOLLO LODGE No.13, AT TROY, N.Y. GENERAL LAFAYETTE PERSONALLY PRESENTED THE APRON TO BROTHER ADNA ADAMS TREAT, THEN WORSHIPFUL MASTER, WHO HAD RECEIVED HIM. IN LATER YEARS BROTHER TREAT HAD THE FURTHER DISTINCTION OF BEING THE OLDEST LIFE MEMBER OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW YORK, AND AT THE TIME OF HIS DEATH IN 1800. AT THE AGE OF ALMOST ONE HUNDRED FOUR YEARS, HE WAS THE OLDEST LIVING MASON IN THE UNITED STATES. THE APRON WAS HANDED DOWN TO BROTHER TREAT'S SON, CHARLES A.TREAT, OF DENVER, WHO IN TURN GAVE IT TO HIS BROTHER, MARCUS J.R. TREAT. OF HAYES CITY, KANSAS, AND HE PRESENTED IT TO HIS NEPHEW, NATHAN O. VOSBURGH, FOR MANY YEARS TREASURER OF ALBERT PIKE LODGE.

Lodge the next meeting, Bro. Kyle Ennenga handed me a small brass plaque. He told me that it was given to him by another Brother several years ago who had taken it to shine it, and he'd just recently found it in a drawer. The plaque was badly tarnished and I could barely make inscription. lt was description of how and when Lafayette had presented this apron to Apollo Lodge No. 13 during his "grand tour" of the United States in 1826, and how the apron came to

be passed down to Albert Pike Lodge No. 117. The apron was displayed for a while, then eventually relegated to our storage closet where it languished until WB Chris Scott found it. The apron was sent to the George Washington Memorial in Alexandria VA to be authenticated. It was on display there for several years before it returned to us where it proudly sits in our 5<sup>th</sup> floor display case.

I've thoroughly cleaned and applied museum grade "Renaissance Wax" to the plaque (pictured above) and it will join the apron in our display case.





# Celebrating Valentine's Day

Brothers, whether you love it, hate it, or are just going through the motions, it's that time of year - Valentine's Day.

So what's this have to do with Masonry?

If you're asking this question, then you either haven't checked this year's calendar or else you aren't in a relationship because this year, our Stated Communication falls on Valentine's Day.

Behind most good Masons is his spouse or romantic significant other. Without their support, we wouldn't be able to take time away from home for all we do in Masonry. Some of us go all out with a romantic dinner, flowers, candy, cards and gifts. Your faithful Secretary is blessed with a spouse that considers Valentine's Day as just another day without so much as a "Happy Valentine's Day" passed between us.

I'd guess that most of you fall somewhere comfortably between an allout romantic effort, and a complete indifference to the day. Here's a bit of historical perspective on the holiday.



One of the most accepted stories is that the Roman Emperor Claudius II was attempting to build up a more powerful army about 270 AD, and forbid the young men to marry. In the spirit of love, St. Valentine performed secret marriages for the young men and their ladies. Claudius was incensed at this, and ordered St. Valentine executed on February 14<sup>th</sup>. While imprisoned, St. Valetine supposedly fell in love with a mysterious girl that was believed to be his prosecutor's daughter and wrote her a love letter signed "From your Valentine".

A much different bawdy tale relates the Roman festival of Lupecalia. On February 15<sup>th</sup> of each year, there was a raucous day long celebration, the highlight of which the men stripped naked and spanked the fair young maidens in hopes of increasing fertility. Both of these stories are supported by the Catholic church's Papal decision in 496 AD making the feast of St. Valentine an official holiday in hopes of expelling the pagan rituals of Lupercalia.

Moving far ahead to 1415, Charles Duke of Orleans was imprisoned in the Tower of London and wrote a poem to his wife and referred to her as his Valentine. Over a hundred years later, the infamous King Henry VIII declared February 14<sup>th</sup> a holiday by royal charter.

Today, we exchange more than 145 million Valentine's Day cards, pay outrageous sums of money for roses, and give more than 58 million pounds of chocolate on this day.

So, my Brothers, I'll leave it to you this February 14<sup>th</sup> whether or not we'll see you in Lodge. If you aren't coming to Lodge, I sure hope you've already made dinner reservations for two.
