The year so far has gone well.


We've had some great educational programs and have plenty more planned. We have a Master Mason proficiency also planned, and will hopefully get our other eligible Brethren to do theirs later this year.

From the South

The Junior Warden's chair in the Lodge is in the South, with a bundle of grain placed above him. In some Lodges this is a sheath of corn, while in others it is the bundle of grain. This is symbolic, as we know the JW provides food for the lodge, and makes sure that none convert the means of refreshment in excess. The bundle of wheat/grain is not just a symbolic feature, but has a deeper historical meaning that is often overlooked.

In the Eleusinian Mysteries, women were the only ones to harvest grain, as they were the caretakers for the secrets of special grain that was used in their initiation rituals. The women grew a special type of grain that contained a specific strain of Ergot, which provided the hallucinogenic effect in their initiation and rituals.

This was present in a wheat-milk drink used in India called Soma, while in ancient Egypt hieroglyphics on the walls of the temples referred to it as the Food of the Gods.

Masonry is filled with symbolism and artifacts that contain a rich historical narrative for the human species. This is just one of the countless symbols found in Masonry.

If you are asking yourself, will our JW spike our dinner next time? No, that will be saved for our next Table Lodge!


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Masonic Trivia



Pope Leo XIII b. 2 March 1810 – d. 20 July 1903

A friend to the worker, but a sworn enemy to Freemasonry

Freemasonry has had its share of detractors over the years, but the most powerful and outspoken of them has been the Catholic church.

In April of 1844, a papal bull entitled "Humanum Genus" was promulgated by Pope Leo XIII. Chief among its topics was the argument that the "partisans of Evil" were threatening Christians, especially in the openness of the 19th century towards Freemasonry.

Catholicism had long denounced Freemasonry, beginning with Pope Clement XII's encyclical in 1738 which forbade Catholics from becoming Freemasons. Six more popes before Leo XIII also denounced Freemasonry, but Leo's encyclical was the one best remembered in modern Masonry.

Anathema to the Church's doctrine was Masonry's acceptance of men from all religions: "all who offer themselves are received whatever may be their form of religion, they thereby teach the great error of this age—that a regard for religion should be held as an indifferent matter, and that all religions are alike." (paragraph 16 "Humanum Genus")

Another affront to the teachings of the Church: "the Freemasons also endeavors to take to itself the education of youth. They think that they can easily mold to their opinions that soft and pliant age, and bend it whither they will; and that nothing can be more fitted than this to enable them to bring up the youth of the State after their own plan. Therefore, in the education and instruction of children they allow no share, either of teaching or of discipline, to the ministers of the Church; and in many places they have procured that the education of youth shall be exclusively in the hands of laymen, and that nothing which treats of the most important and most holy duties of men to God shall be introduced into the instructions on morals." (paragraphs 21,22 "Humanum Genus")

To this day, many Catholics believe that belonging to Masonry is at least a mortal sin, if not a call for excommunication from the Church.
